




As you proceed with your career I hope you will study carefully the needs of your country and prepare yourself to meet those needs most effectively. Work diligently and thoughtfully wherever you go.



INTRODUCTION


N the beginning, God created the world, and the firmament, and all of what there is. He worked hard for six days, and on the seventh, rested.
