
THE CHAPEL serves as a daily reminder that the great men who founded the American University of Beirut had one main goal — to climb ever higher.





OUR CAMPUS provides us with numerous scenic spots where we can relax and talk with fellow students.


OUR CAMPUS is green and beautiful because of the many men who spend hours to help make it one of Lebanon's garden spots.

COLLEGE HALL, an AUB landmark, serves as a constant reminder that many great men have struggled to help make us what we are today — grateful graduates.








WE STAND surrounded by trees and plants and exchange notes or ideas before going to another lecture that will help us achieve our goal.

WE PAUSE in the doorways to knowledge, both as we leave (left) and as we enter (below).






COFFEE BREAKS, whether in the morning, afternoon or evening, give us the pause that refreshes and the opportunity to chat with friends.

SIHLOUETTED IN the morning sun, we relax outside Jafet Library and talk to classmates before we re-enter the door to study.




WE PERFORM experiments in our various laboratories, realizing that through our findings we can come closer to our final goals.

WE BECOME thespians and perform in both Arabic and English. In this case it's the Arabic play, Fathers and Sons.




WE PARTICIPATE in musical events, such as the Christmas Concert, when 72 musicians performed under Prof. Arnita's direction.










Seeking to be a forum through which interest can be stimulated in the developments of the different fields of chemistry, the Chemical Society promotes an understanding of the use of chemistry in modern society through public education. Faculty members and invited guests give lectures throughout the year. Discussion opportunities always follow the lectures. To promote close friendships among persons seriously interested in chemistry, the society has sponsored formal dancing parties and receptions. Trips to the Cedars, Beit-ed-Dine and Sidon were arranged. Finally, to see chemistry in the field, trips to industrial plants were arranged.

NE of the largest and most active groups on the campus is the Commerce Studerts' Society. Its biggest project of the year was the Oil Industry Exhibition in January. conomics Society has a dual goal: providing activities for its members and promoting joint projects between member societies in the School of Arts and Sciences. The society attempts to promote understanding and stimulate interest in economics through lectures, debates and informal discussions. Through cooperation with other societies, the society goes beyond economics to create an intellectual atmosphere that will benefit all concerned. The society sponsored two lectures by graduate students and jointly sponsored a pannel discussion with the PSPA Society during A & S Week. Socially, the society visited Farayah, Baalbeck and Al-Koura. Included in its year's agenda were parties and a graduation dinner.

The Education Society has attempted to broaden the study and understanding of educational problems. The society, through its activities, endeavors to promote better relationships between students and to sponsor projects of educational significance. Political Science and Public Administration Society uses lectures, social activities and trips as tools to attain this goal. The PSPA Society practices its role of dedication to future political life by bringing together students of different race, creeds and political viewpoints to work for the benefit of society. Its largest project this year was an experiment, the sessions of the Model Security Council, in which students actually presented the views of member countries on four major issues. A student debate on the prospects and future of socialism in Lebanon and public lectures filled the educational program. Socially there were the acquaintance reception, the Christmas Ball and a trip to Baalbek in addition to the annual graduation dinner.

HILOSOPHY, the discipline of thought, is brought to life through the Philosophy Society. This group endeavors to encourage philosophical inquiry, exchange, original ideas and emphasize the role of philosophy in shaping modern thought. To promote a favorable campus attitude toward philosophy, the society meets bi-weekly for the reading of papers and discussion. Professors are invited to meet with the group and lead debates. The society sponsored a public series of lectures during the John Dewey Centennial in October. It also sponsored a panel discussion in memory of Albert Camus in January. The famous English philosopher, A. C. Ewing, also lectured to the society. Socially, the group visited Shtaura, the Cedars and the village of the Lebanese artist, Michel Basbous.





LTIUS, ever higher, is best applied to sports where the aim is to break records. But breaking records is not the only goal; one can constantly strive, through athletics, to improve his physical fitness and gain a proper mental attitude. This year many records have been broken, and the A & S team have fared well against all other schools. In football, A & S recaptured the crown from Engineering in the Autumn Games and kept the title in the Winter Games. In the Spring, our athletes dropped the football championship but soared ever higher in the 66th Annual Field Day, when they almost doubled the score of their closest rivals and two of our runners set two AUB records. To excell requires training and patience, acceptance of defeat and spirit for that last extra push needed to snap the tape or clear the bar. Sportsmanship is a sign of maturity, and our athletes have proved, that whether win or lose, they have a sense of fair play.



JOHN SAHAKIAN breaks the tape in the 200-meter dash in the Spring Games for a new AUB record. He also tied the record in the 100-meter dash.


UR athletes came through like the champions they are in both the fall and spring field days. In fact their victories were runaways as far as the team races and were record breaking for two athletes.

In the autumn games, Norman Himadeh and Richard Moats dominated in the field events, while teammate John Sahakian swept the 100 and 200-meter dashes.

In the recent Spring games, Sahakian and Michel Tawil were outstanding as they were both double winners and record breakers. Sahakian set a new mark of 22.8 seconds in the 200 and tied the mark of 10.9 in the 100. Tawil broke the 400-meter mark with a time of 52.2 seconds and ran a fine race against the Engineer's Shilbay'ya to win the 800-meter run in 2:03.1.

Himadeh was the individual champion in the Spring games with Moats in the runner-up spot. Himadeh's firsts came in the high jump and the 200-meter hurdles, while Moats won the shot put and tied for first in the pole vault.



A veteran squad played up to its potential in both the first two championships, but a revitalized Engineering eleven won the spring crown from our squad, 3-2.

John Shibr's thrilling unassisted screw shot provided a last-minute margin in the win in the Winter Games, 1-0. Goalie Makram Rahhal was outstanding in the nets and deserved his shutout.

The squad was led by the play of Captain Rolandos Virardi, Shibr, Rahhal, Ramzi Alamudin, and George Abu Khader during most of the season's play. The year's record was six wins eight losses and two ties. Seven of the losses were to outside teams. The team seemed to play closer to its potential only when the game involved interschool rivalry as the record indicates.

While here at the University, Prof. Illick has not only taught courses but has taken keen interest in the cartography and economic and regional geography of the Middle East over which he has traveled considerably.



While studying General Education, the student also learns about Western and Middle Eastern civilization from the 19th century to the present.



Study in the pure science of physics has been the choice of study for six juniors, six seniors, six graduate students, and one special student.

The department's research has been concentrated in the following fields due to limitation of facilities which will soon be expanded: paramagnetic resonance absorption, molecular physics, very low temperature physics, the intensity of cosmic-ray photon project, theoretical physics, and diffusion in solids. The Research Corporation has contributed a total of \$20,000 to date and has encouraged the study of diffusion in single crystals, the electronic sturcture of molecular systems, and paramagnetic resonance absorption. The department has also received several other grants for further study in selected fields.

Wherever you might be in Lebanon you are likely to meet the inmates of this book, for they are the everyday people and happenings, alive, lovable captivating.

Though some of the scenes depicted are more typical of village life than that of the

town, once out of the main thoroughfares, even in Beirut our capital, all goes on the same way.

On most of the three arcaded Lebanese balconies a small basket at the end of a long rope, awaits the orders of its master.

"Om Ali" sells her wild chicory in residential quarters, for the millionaires of Beirut enjoy its slightly bitter taste as much as the peasant who picks it by his door.

"Kebbé" is still the bane of city dwellers in our large, new apartment houses for whereas not all share the dish, they all share the noise thereof.

Look out for the "four bachelors" on the "tram" at the "rush hour" of course. They are going to the "Place des Canons" to have "shawerma" for lunch.

All those "tableaux vivants", these customs which make a country lovable, different, endearing, are slowly disappearing.

Soon our mountain bread will be kneaded by an automatic mixer, our "kebbé" pounded by an electronic pounder, a "barbecue" will replace "shawerma", gay tramways will be replaced by grave trolley buses, and can you imagine a frisky basket going down from the heights of an austere sky-scraper? Our wild chicory will soon be sterilised, put in nylon bags and placed in self-service shops which will replace our street vendors: and those delightful donkeys, long suffering and cheerful, what will happen to them, when this mode of transport will be eliminated by some motorised vehicle?

Even now, one has to go far and high up in our mountains to see the dancers of the sword and shield and those of the lively dabké.

That is why I have tried, very humbly, to carve out these passing scenes of my country, to keep them a bit longer, and to make them known; to carve them out on wood, for it is strong and vibrant and vital as are the people and customs of this my beloved Lebanon.
